JAVIER AGUIRREGABIRIA PRESIDENT ITAKA-ESCOLAPIOS



hen a few years ago we reflected in our teams and planned the future of Itaka-Escolapios, 2021 appeared on the horizon as a key year: end of the strategic period 2015-2021 of the network, time to evaluate and plan for the new six-year period, year of anniversaries and important Piarist meetings ... Now we can say that, of course, this year has been key for all this, but it has been in a special way and certainly not expected in that not-so-distant past.

A large part of the reason for this is undoubtedly due to the pandemic situation that began two years ago, and which has continued to affect all levels in this academic year 2020-2021. This has forced the Itaka-Escolapios Network to reposition itself as an organization, to adapt its actions and to respond, as far as possible, to the new challenges that this reality has placed before us.

As a response to a great challenge for the whole international network, we launched a new solidarity campaign this year, with the slogan "Restarting to transform", to raise awareness of the economic, social, and educational effects of the crisis, to know how the Itaka-Escolapios Network is facing them and to mobilize solidarity to support and strengthen our mission in this context. Certainly, the overall assessment of this campaign has been positive, due to the level of participation and involvement achieved, as well as the resources obtained, which are essential for Itaka-Escolapios to continue its work in many impoverished places with particularly vulnerable populations.

A particular highlight of the past academic year was the March 2021, at the beginning of which we participated as Itaka-Escolapios in the II Assembly of the General Piarist Fraternity. It was a valuable meeting that served to make visible and strengthen the intense bond between the Fraternity and Itaka-Escolapios (of which the Fraternity is a founder), as well as the commitment to mutual support in the development of both Piarist realities.

Also, in March we held the IV Advisory Council of Itaka-Escolapios, which is the most important meeting of our network and which brings together the main leaders and teams every three years. On this occasion, due to the pandemic, it had to be an online meeting (as was the Fraternity Assembly), which was a limitation but also an opportunity: this format allowed us to increase the number of participants, making it a more numerous, diverse, and participative meeting than ever before: up to 80 people participated online, connected from around twenty different countries.

During the working days of this Advisory Council, we celebrated a very significant anniversary for our organization: March 9th, 2021 was the twentieth anniversary of the constitution of the Itaka-Escolapios Foundation, an occasion to look back with gratitude on the road travelled and to look to the future with enthusiasm. In this spirit, our way of celebrating it as a network was a special meeting of those who have always been the heart of Itaka-Escolapios and are its hallmark: our volunteers. This first virtual International Meeting of Itaka-Escolapios Volunteers was an important moment to get to know and recognize the diversity and richness of our volunteers, as well as to share our concerns and dreams.

The past year has left us with an important outcome, which at the same time is a great task for the coming years: the new Strategic Plan 2021-27 of the Itaka-Escolapios network, a plan whose strategic lines can be summarized in advancing in participation and shared mission. At the time of writing this report, we are already at work in the different teams and areas of the network to concretize, from the diversity of situations, the objectives of this plan and to make them a reality.

I will end these lines with a reference to something very typical of these times, which in Itaka-Escolapios we are perceiving in our day-to-day life and it is an ambivalent feeling: on the one hand, the experience of fragility, especially felt from the projects and the work with the poorest and most vulnerable people; on the other hand, the strength of what is shared. These are two lessons that call those of us who form part of Itaka-Escolapios, to take care of our network, to persevere in our commitment to people and to grow in co-responsibility and solidarity. This is what we are doing!

ACTIVITY REPORT

Throughout the academic year 2020–2021, Itaka-Escolapios has been present in 55 municipalities in 16 countries, favoring the education of the most disadvantaged people as the best way to transform the world and prepare a better tomorrow. 
SOCIO-EDUCATIONAL CENTERS

taka-Escolapios is responsible for the canteens of the primary schools in Cameroon, which guarantee a sufficient and balanced diet to around 3,700 children. In Spain, we have coordinated with 9 educational centers a system of scholarships for 69 children who do not have access to quality food.

HUMANITARIAN AND EMERGENCY AID



he actions of education for social transformation have the task of ensuring education in values in each Piarist presence in which Itaka Escolapios is based. Throughout the 2020-2021 academic year, we have deepened the values of solidarity and peace education. Through the Solidarity Campaign we were present in 64 Piarist educational centers in Brazil, Spain, Mexico, Mozambique, Senegal, and Venezuela, raising awareness and raising €162,000 for the Piarist missions most affected by COVID-19.

SOCIAL GUIDANCE

e accompany, advise, and empower the beneficiaries of our projects to promote their autonomy and social integration. More than 500 people have been accompanied in Spain and the DRC on employment issues, life skills or access to resources, among other services.

500 people have been accompanied he situation of social, economic, or armed conflict in some Piarist presences has obliged us, in 2020-2021, to assist more than 1,200 displaced and host families in Cameroon and more than 400 displaced families who have settled in the communities of our presence in Mozambique, in a camp for displaced persons/refugees. In addition, we have assisted more than 300 people from the Piarist communities in Venezuela who are unable to access a basic food bag.

BOARDING SCHOOLS AND RESIDENCES

hroughout the academic year 2020-2021 we have managed a network of accommodation in Bolivia, Indonesia, India, and Senegal aimed at guaranteeing access to education for around 650 children and young people who otherwise would not have access to education.

ECONOMIC REPORT 2020-2021

We hereby present the annual accounts of the Itaka-Escolapios Foundation for the 2020-2021 academic year. These accounts have been approved by the Board of Trustees at its meeting of January 13th, 2022 and externally audited.

he 2020-2021 academic year, although far from the extraordinary of the previous academic year, marked by the confinement and the impact on a large part of the activities of Itaka-Escolapios, has still been marked by a context in which, although the activities have been recovering normality, the effects of COVID-19 and the restrictions affecting the activities have still been felt and, ultimately, have had an impact on the Foundation's accounts.

On the economic side, the most relevant facts have been:

A significant drop (-331,000 £) in the fees charged for the different projects, especially: in the Calasanz Movement, due to the activities that could not be organized in some venues; and in the hostels, due to the lower use of these. Although the expenses have also been lower than those of a course at full capacity, they have meant a significant drop that has prevented the minimum expenses incurred from being covered.

An increase in subsidies and agreements signed with the Spanish public administration (+196,000 £), especially due to the start-up of two new homes in Soria. Overall, the subsidies included in the budget have been obtained for all projects.

A recovery of solidarity contributions from tithes, provinces, members, and other donations, remaining somewhat above not only the budgeted amount (+65,000 £) but even above the levels prior to the beginning of the pandemic.

The development cooperation grants obtained to support projects in other countries have been, although less than budgeted (-81,000 £), considerably higher than what has been achieved in recent years.

On the more negative side, a solidarity campaign more necessary than ever to support the projects in all the countries of the Itaka-Escolapios Network, although not as bad as the previous year, has not yet recovered the fundraising capacity of the years prior to the arrival of COVID-19 (-54,000 £ worse than expected), which has a huge impact on many projects supported thanks to this campaign.

Overall, Itaka-Escolapios revenue amounted to 5,468,353.91 £ and expenses to 5,499,581.66 £, leaving a deficit of 31,227.75 £.

The graph showing the distribution of expenses by programs considers the new organizational chart approved by the IV Advisory Council of Itaka-Escolapios, which includes new programs such as training for employment, social orientation, or the strengthening of the Piarist fraternity, which is financially supported by Itaka-Escolapios in some districts.


Looking ahead to next year, costs are expected to increase as all countries in the network resume full project activity, making it necessary to continue to look for ways to increase income to sustain this.


